Seeds at the Library

- ① On Tuesday, Maya's class visited the town library's seed garden. Mr. Chen said, "We're here to learn how tiny seeds become plants." The garden's beds held beans, lettuce, and sunflowers. Each student carried a notebook, but nobody's pencil stayed clean. Damp soil covered the children's hands as they examined seeds of many shapes under a magnifying glass.
- ② First, the class compared the seeds' coats. A bean's coat felt smooth, while a sunflower seed's coat had pale stripes. Maya wrote, "It's surprising that these small seeds can make tall plants." Mr. Chen explained that a seed needs water, air, and warmth before it can begin growing. The students' notes included careful drawings of each one.
- ③ Later, everyone planted radish seeds in the garden's empty corner. The class's watering chart showed whose turn came each day. "Don't forget Friday," Maya told her partner. "I'll check the soil after lunch." By the next week, the radishes' first leaves had appeared. The children couldn't pick them yet, because the plants needed time to grow.
