Following Monarchs

- ① Every fall, millions of eastern monarch butterflies travel from the United States and Canada to mountain forests in central Mexico. Scientists and volunteers study this migration because a butterfly may fly hundreds or even thousands of miles. The nonprofit Monarch Watch gives volunteers tiny, numbered stickers to place carefully on monarch wings. Each sticker has a code that can identify one butterfly.
- ② When a tagged monarch is seen later, a person can report the sticker code, date, and place. These later sightings give scientists evidence about the butterfly's migration route. Journey North collects and maps reports of first monarch sightings and other seasonal signs. Its maps help people notice when monarchs appear in different places. Weather, especially wind and temperature, can affect how quickly monarchs travel.
- ③ The Monarch Joint Venture brings together groups that share research and ideas for protecting monarchs. It explains that scientists use many kinds of evidence, not just one report, to understand migration. A careful set of notes can name each source, record an important concept, and give a short summary. For example, notes should connect stickers, sightings, maps, and weather instead of listing unrelated facts.

Source: Monarch Watch Important concept: Monarch Watch helps identify individual monarchs. Details: Volunteers use tiny numbered stickers. Each sticker has a code. Source: Journey North Important concept: Journey North shows where monarchs appear. Details: It collects first-sighting reports. It maps seasonal signs. Source: Monarch Joint Venture Important concept: The group helps people use migration evidence. Details: It brings groups together. It shares research and ideas for protecting monarchs. Summary: Monarch migration is studied with evidence from tagged butterflies, reported sightings, and maps. Monarch Watch supplies numbered stickers, and later reports show routes. Journey North maps seasonal reports. Wind and temperature can change travel speed. The Monarch Joint Venture shares research and ideas for protecting monarchs.
