Lena’s Butterfly Slides

- ① For a slide show about monarch butterflies, Lena found a fact on the U.S. Forest Service website: monarchs travel thousands of miles between Canada and Mexico. She wrote the fact in her own words, then added a citation on the slide: U.S. Forest Service, “Monarch Butterfly.” Changing the words did not make the fact hers. The citation tells where the information came from.
- ② Next, Lena chose a migration map made by Journey North. Under the map, she wrote, “Map: Journey North, Monarch Migration Map.” She did not draw the map, so she gave credit to its creator. On another slide, she used Carl Sagan’s exact words: “Science is more than a body of knowledge. It is a way of thinking.” She used quotation marks and cited Carl Sagan, *The Demon-Haunted World*, 1995.
- ③ Lena found a short music clip online for her butterfly video. Before using it, she checked the license. The clip was marked Creative Commons Attribution, so her final screen said, “Music: ‘Carefree’ by Kevin MacLeod, Incompetech, CC BY 4.0.” If she could not find a source or permission, Lena would choose different music. Credit helps readers tell what work belongs to Lena and what came from others.
