Native Flowers at School

- ① Native plants and nonnative plants can both grow in a school garden, but they do not help wildlife in the same ways. Native plants have grown in an area for a long time. Therefore, local insects often use them for food or shelter. In contrast, some nonnative plants may offer less useful food to local insects. A garden with native plants can support more kinds of nearby creatures.
- ② Sometimes, however, a garden has few native flowers, so pollinators cannot find enough food through the season. This is a problem for bees, butterflies, and plants that need pollinators. To solve it, students can add several kinds of native flowers that bloom at different times. For example, early spring flowers and late summer flowers provide food during more months. As a result, pollinators can visit the garden longer.
- ③ Native flowers also affect the garden after insects arrive. Because bees carry pollen from flower to flower, many plants can make seeds. Consequently, the garden may produce seeds for next year's plants. Birds may eat some seeds, and they can spread others to new places. Thus, choosing native flowers can start a chain of changes that helps the garden and the animals around it.

2	Why did the author choose a problem/solution pattern for paragraph 2?	The author explains that pollinators may not have enough food, then gives the solution of planting several native flowers that bloom at different times.
3	What organizational pattern does the author use in paragraph 3? How do "Because" and "Consequently" help readers understand it?	Cause/effect. "Because" introduces a cause, and "Consequently" signals an effect of bees carrying pollen.
4	How do the three organizational patterns help the author's purpose of explaining why native flowers are useful?	The patterns show how native plants differ from nonnative plants, how to solve a food shortage for pollinators, and what effects native flowers can have on the garden.
