A Warning at the Lighthouse

- ① At sunrise, I carried my sketchbook to the old lighthouse on Cedar Point. Salt wind tugged my hat, and gulls cried above the gray waves. My cousin Lena raced up the rocky path behind me. "Wait for me!" she called. We planned to draw the lighthouse before the town's boat parade began at noon along the bay.
- ② Near the door, Lena stopped and pointed at a dark cloud rising beyond the harbor. "That smoke is close to the boathouse," she said. My stomach tightened. We hurried down the steps, where the air smelled sharp and smoky. "We need to tell someone," I said, grabbing my phone. Then I saw Mr. Ortiz, the harbor master, checking ropes below.
- ③ Mr. Ortiz listened, then ran toward the boathouse with us. A small trash fire crackled beside a metal bin, sending orange sparks into the wind. He used a nearby extinguisher, and the fire died with a hiss. "You noticed it early," he told Lena and me. As the clean, cool air returned, we watched the parade boats glide past the lighthouse.

1	Who is the narrator, and is the story told in first person or third person? Use one word from the passage as evidence.	The unnamed person carrying the sketchbook is the narrator. It is first person, shown by the word "I."
2	How does Lena's dialogue about the smoke advance the plot?	Her warning makes the narrator notice the danger and hurry to tell someone.
3	What does the phrase "the air smelled sharp and smoky" help you understand about the setting and the problem?	It shows that the smoke is nearby and makes the fire problem feel urgent.
4	What genre is this text? Name the beginning, middle, and end of its plot.	It is realistic fiction. Beginning: the narrator and Lena go to the lighthouse. Middle: Lena sees smoke and they warn Mr. Ortiz. End: Mr. Ortiz puts out the fire, and they watch the parade boats.
