The Lantern at the Crossing

- ① In 1863, eleven-year-old Nora lived near a railroad station in Pennsylvania. Her older brother, Eli, carried messages for the Union army. One cold evening, Eli rushed home with a torn map. “A bridge ahead is weak,” he whispered. “The supply train must be warned before dawn.” Outside, snow covered the road, and the wind stung Nora’s cheeks.
- ② Nora wanted to stay by the fire, but she saw Eli’s blue lips and shaking hands. “I can go,” she said, pulling on her boots. Eli pointed to the lantern. “Wave this at the crossing.” Nora trudged through deep snow. At the tracks, she heard the train’s distant rumble. She lifted the lantern high and swung it in wide, bright circles.
- ③ The engineer saw the flashing light and pulled the brake. The train stopped before the broken bridge. By morning, workers had repaired the wooden beams. Eli smiled at Nora. “You faced that storm for people you did not know.” Nora warmed her hands near the station stove. She still disliked the icy wind, but she knew that courage meant acting when someone needed help.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What is the central conflict in the story? How is it resolved?	A supply train is heading toward a weak, broken bridge. Nora signals with the lantern, and the engineer stops the train before it reaches the bridge.
2	What do Nora's words and actions show about her character? Use two details from the passage.	Nora is courageous and helpful. She says, "I can go," puts on her boots, and walks through deep snow to warn the train.
3	What is a theme of the story? Name the thematic topic and explain the message using one detail from the passage.	The topic is courage. The story shows that courage means helping others even when a task is difficult, as Nora goes into the icy storm to warn the train.
4	Who narrates the story, and what is the point of view? Give evidence from the passage.	A narrator outside the story tells it in third person. The narrator calls the main character "Nora" and uses "she" to describe her actions and thoughts.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Challenge: Eli brings home a torn map and says the bridge is weak. Response: Nora takes the lantern to the crossing and swings it in bright circles. Result: The engineer stops the train before the broken bridge. Nora's signal causes the engineer to brake, so the train avoids the bridge.

Accept equivalent descriptions that accurately cite the weak bridge, Nora's lantern signal, and the stopped train. For the open task, look for three events in logical plot order and a clear cause-and-effect explanation.
