The School Garden

- ① On Tuesday, Maya carried a bucket to the school garden after lunch. She noticed the tomato leaves drooping in the hot sun. First, she filled a watering can at the spigot. Then she gave each plant a slow drink. By the time the bell rang, the leaves stood up again, and Maya felt proud of her work.
- ② Tomato plants need sunlight, water, and nutrients to grow. Most tomato plants grow best with at least six hours of direct sunlight each day. Their roots take in water from the soil. Compost can add nutrients that help plants make stems, leaves, flowers, and fruit. Gardeners check the soil often because very dry soil can slow a plant's growth.
- ③ Our school should place a rain barrel near the garden. Rain barrels collect water from roofs, so gardeners can use less water from the spigot. They also hold water for dry days, when plants need it most. The barrel would help the garden and teach students how to save water. Ask the principal to approve one this year.
