Maya's Lemonade Stand

- ① On Saturday morning, Maya carried a folding table to the corner near her apartment. She wanted to sell lemonade and earn money for the animal shelter's food drive. Her uncle had donated lemons, cups, and a bright yellow sign. Just as Maya mixed the first pitcher, dark clouds covered the sun, and fat drops began to splash on her sign.
- ② Maya hurried to pull the table under the building awning, but the rain blew sideways. If the cups got wet, no one could use them. First, she carried the cups inside the lobby. Next, she and her uncle moved the lemons and pitcher to a dry bench. Maya stared at the empty corner and wondered how she could still help the shelter.
- ③ Then Maya noticed people entering the lobby to stay dry. She placed her sign beside the door and asked her uncle for a small tray. From the dry bench, she poured cups one at a time and offered them to neighbors. By noon, Maya had sold most of the lemonade. She packed the remaining supplies, counted her earnings, and smiled because the shelter would receive the money.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

On the morning of the school fun run, Luis opened his backpack and found one muddy sneaker instead of two. The other sneaker was missing, and the race would start in twenty minutes. First, Luis searched under the bench near the field. Next, he asked the coach if anyone had turned in a shoe. A younger student pointed to the bus steps, where Luis found his sneaker stuck behind a seat. Luis cleaned the mud with a towel and tied both shoes. He reached the starting line just as the whistle blew. Luis ran the race and felt relieved that he had solved the problem.
