Our School Garden

- ① Our school garden is a useful outdoor classroom where students learn by growing food. Behind the library, raised beds hold tomatoes, beans, lettuce, and herbs. Classes measure plants, pull weeds, and watch bees visit the flowers. The garden gives us real things to observe, so lessons become easier to understand and remember during the week.
- ② Students can use the garden to practice important math and science skills. In math, they count seedlings and compare the heights of sunflowers each Friday. In science, they record which plants need more water and notice how insects help some flowers make seeds. These careful observations turn a small plot of soil into a place for meaningful learning.
- ③ The garden also teaches our school community to make thoughtful choices about food. When lettuce and herbs are ready, students harvest them and share them with the cafeteria staff. A class may taste a leaf of basil before deciding whether to add it to a recipe. By caring for the garden from seed to harvest, students see where fresh food begins.
