Native Flowers for Bees

- ① Native flower patches can help bees find food in a neighborhood. Bees collect nectar, a sweet liquid, and pollen from flowers. They use nectar for energy, and they carry pollen as they move. Pollen helps many flowering plants make seeds. A patch with several kinds of native flowers can offer bees food during different parts of the growing season.
- ② Native plants are flowers, grasses, or shrubs that grew in an area long before people planted gardens there. Because these plants match the local climate, they often grow well with less extra watering after they are established. For example, a purple coneflower patch may bloom in summer, while goldenrod blooms later. These different bloom times give bees a steadier supply of nectar and pollen.
- ③ People can make a useful bee patch by choosing several native plants with different bloom times. First, they can place the plants where they will receive the sunlight each kind needs. Then, they can avoid spraying pesticides on the flowers, because pesticides can harm bees. In this way, a small planting can provide food and a safer place for visiting pollinators.

2	How does paragraph 2 develop the central idea? Give two details from the paragraph.	It explains that native plants match the local climate and often need less extra watering. It also gives the example of coneflowers blooming in summer and goldenrod blooming later, which provides food at different times.
3	What does the word "Because" show in paragraph 2, and what does "For example" introduce?	"Because" shows a cause and effect relationship. "For example" introduces a specific example of flowers with different bloom times.
4	How does paragraph 3 serve as a conclusion? Name one action it gives and the final result it explains.	It gives an action, such as choosing plants with different bloom times or avoiding pesticides. It concludes that a small planting can provide food and a safer place for pollinators.

A native flower patch can give bees food through much of the growing season. For example, purple coneflowers may bloom in summer, while goldenrod blooms later. In addition, native plants often grow well in the local climate with less extra watering after they are established. Therefore, choosing several native plants with different bloom times can create a helpful place for bees.
