Maya's Monarch Report

- ① Good morning, classmates. Today I will explain how monarch butterflies travel long distances during migration. First, monarchs east of the Rocky Mountains fly south each fall, often toward central Mexico. These insects use sunlight and Earth's magnetic field to help guide their journey. I stand tall, face the class, and use a clear, medium-speed voice so everyone can follow my opening idea.
- ② Next, I say, "The trip is not the same for every butterfly." No single monarch completes the entire round trip. Several generations are born along the way. I point to a map only when it supports my words, and I pause after this important fact. My volume is loud enough for the back row, but I do not shout.
- ③ Finally, I explain why the journey matters. Monarchs need places with nectar for food and sheltered areas for rest. In Mexico, many spend winter in mountain forests with oyamel fir trees. I pronounce the place names carefully, then end by saying, "Protecting habitats can help monarchs survive." I look up at my listeners before I finish.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Good morning, classmates. Today I will explain why recycling paper is useful. First, making new paper from recycled paper can use less energy and water than making paper from wood. (Speak loudly enough for the back row and pronounce "recycling" clearly.) Next, recycling keeps some paper out of landfills. (Look at listeners, then pause.) Finally, people should recycle clean, dry paper when local rules accept it. I think our school should place labeled recycling bins near classrooms.
