A Report on Riverbend Community Garden

- ① Hello. Today I will report on the Riverbend Community Garden, a shared space where neighbors grow food and flowers. First, I will explain how the garden works. Each small piece of ground is called a plot. Here, plot means a garden space, not a secret plan in a story. Clear word meanings help listeners follow a report.
- ② Next, the garden has paths wide enough for people who use wheelchairs, and it has raised beds that some gardeners can reach more easily. I would not say that all older adults need raised beds, because people have different strengths and needs. The garden welcomes children, adults, and visitors with many kinds of experience. Specific, respectful words describe people fairly.
- ③ Finally, I will share one result. Last summer, volunteers gave extra tomatoes and beans to the food pantry, where families chose groceries. This example shows how the garden supports the community. In conclusion, Riverbend Community Garden grows plants and builds connections. When speakers explain words clearly and avoid broad claims about groups, listeners can understand the topic and feel respected.
