Tide Pool Field Notes

- ① At the rocky shore, I opened my field notebook before the tide rose. I printed the date, location, and weather at the top of a fresh page. Each letter sat on the line, and I left a finger-width space between words. Clear notes helped my partner read the page later without asking me to explain what I had seen.
- ② Next, we studied a sea star in a shallow pool. I printed its name clearly beside a small sketch, using a capital letter only at the beginning. My letters were about the same height, so no word looked crowded or stretched. I added the observation, "Five arms moved slowly over the wet rock." A period showed where the sentence ended.
- ③ Before leaving, I checked every line in the notebook. I made the letters in the word "crab" easy to tell apart, especially b and r. I also kept the label "tide pool" separate from the sentence below it. When rain splashed the page, the writing still looked neat enough for our class to use during tomorrow's discussion.
