Maya's Butterfly Poster

- ① When Maya made a poster about monarch butterflies, she used a fact from the National Park Service website: Monarchs travel long distances during migration. After the fact, she wrote a citation, National Park Service, Monarch Butterflies. The citation told readers where the fact came from. Maya did not pretend she had discovered the fact herself, even though she wrote the sentence in her own words.
- ② Next, Maya wanted to use a ranger's exact words. She put the words in quotation marks and named the speaker: Ranger Elena Cruz said, "Small gardens can help hungry butterflies." She also read an article that suggested planting native flowers. Maya explained that idea in a new sentence and cited the article. Changing a few words is not enough. A citation gives credit for another person's words and ideas.
- ③ Maya found a butterfly photo online for her poster. Under the photo, she listed the photographer's name, the photo title, the website, and the date she viewed it. If she added a song to a video, she would credit the musician and the song title, too. Photos, drawings, music, and videos are media made by people. Credit helps readers find the original work.
