YOUR JOB Underline Jordan's final research question. Circle details that show why Jordan trusts or rejects a source, and number the parts of the note-taking plan that give credit to sources.

Following the Monarchs

- ① Jordan wanted to learn why monarch butterflies travel long distances each fall. At first, Jordan asked, "Where do monarchs go?" A library book showed that eastern monarchs spend winter in mountain forests in central Mexico. Jordan revised the question to, "What conditions do monarchs need in their winter habitat?" The new question was narrower and could guide a focused search.
- ② Jordan searched the terms "monarch winter habitat," "central Mexico forests," and "monarch temperature needs." A university website explained that cool temperatures help monarchs save energy, and a park service page described the oyamel fir forests where they cluster. Jordan chose these sources because known organizations published them and each page listed an author or agency. A colorful travel blog had no author or sources, so Jordan did not use it.
- ③ Jordan wrote notes in a chart instead of copying full sentences. One note said, "Cool winter temperatures help monarchs save energy," followed by the source name, author, and webpage title. Another note summarized the park service information about fir forests. For a poster, Jordan planned headings for habitat, temperature, and sources. The source list would give credit for facts, words, and any photographs used.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	How did Jordan revise the first research question, and why was the new question more useful?	Jordan changed the broad question about where monarchs go to a question about conditions in their winter habitat. The new question was narrower and guided a focused search.
2	What three search terms did Jordan use?	"monarch winter habitat," "central Mexico forests," and "monarch temperature needs."
3	Why did Jordan use the university and park service sources but not the travel blog?	The university and park service sources came from known organizations and listed an author or agency. The travel blog had no author or sources.
4	What did Jordan do in the notes and source list to avoid plagiarism and give credit?	Jordan summarized information instead of copying full sentences and included the source name, author, and webpage title. The source list credited facts, words, and photographs.

Question: How do sea otters help kelp forests along the California coast? Search terms: sea otter kelp forest, sea urchins kelp, California kelp habitat. Note 1: Sea otters eat sea urchins, so fewer urchins eat kelp. Source: NOAA Fisheries, "Sea Otters," [fisheries.noaa.gov/species/sea-otters](https://www.fisheries.noaa.gov/species/sea-otters). Note 2: Kelp forests grow in cold, shallow coastal water. Source: Encyclopaedia Britannica, "Kelp Forest," [britannica.com/science/kelp-forest](https://www.britannica.com/science/kelp-forest). I would trust NOAA Fisheries more because it is a government science agency.

Accept other focused questions, relevant search terms, accurate paraphrased notes, and clear source credits. Students should explain reliability using evidence such as the author, organization, evidence, or source information.
