A Place for Native Gardens

- ① Cities should plant more native flower gardens in parks and along sidewalks. Native plants grow naturally in a region, so they are suited to its weather and soil. This can mean gardeners use less water and fewer fertilizers. In my view, a small native garden is a smart use of public space because it can help people and wildlife at the same time.
- ② One reason native gardens deserve public support is that they feed local pollinators. Bees, butterflies, and some other insects collect nectar and pollen from flowers. A report from the Xerces Society explains that native plants often provide better food for native bees than many nonnative ornamental plants. Therefore, choosing native flowers can give pollinators useful food close to where they live.
- ③ Native gardens can also make neighborhoods more interesting places to learn. City leaders ought to add signs that name each plant and explain which animals use it. Seeing a monarch caterpillar on milkweed, for instance, can teach visitors that milkweed is an important food plant for monarch caterpillars. That evidence supports my point that native gardens are not only pretty but also useful outdoor classrooms.
