Mount St. Helens: Two Accounts

- ① On May 18, 1980, Mount St. Helens in Washington erupted after weeks of earthquakes and swelling ground. The north side of the volcano collapsed in a huge landslide. Pressure released from inside the mountain, sending a sideways blast, ash, and hot gas across the land. Scientists and nearby residents described the same disaster, but they noticed different parts of it.
- ② Geologist David Johnston watched from a ridge about six miles away. He had studied the growing bulge and warned that the volcano could erupt. When the north side slid away, he radioed, "Vancouver! Vancouver! This is it!" His account focuses on the volcano's sudden change and the danger he had predicted. Johnston was killed by the blast soon after his call.
- ③ One nearby resident later remembered that daylight turned dark as ash fell. Her family had left their home after officials ordered evacuations, so they watched the sky from a safer town. Her account focuses on fear, darkness, and worry about neighbors. Unlike Johnston, she did not explain the landslide. Her experience shows how evacuation orders affected people before the eruption.

2	What is one important similarity between Johnston's account and the resident's account?	Both accounts show that the Mount St. Helens eruption was dangerous.
3	How do Johnston's and the resident's points of view differ? Use information about their locations or experiences.	Johnston focused on scientific warning signs and the landslide from his ridge. The resident focused on dark ash, fear, and concern for neighbors after evacuating.
4	Why did the resident's family watch the eruption from a safer town instead of from their home?	Officials ordered evacuations, so the family left their home before the eruption.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Both accounts show that the eruption created danger for people near Mount St. Helens. Johnston focused on the landslide and warning signs, while the resident focused on dark ash and concern for neighbors. Their views differ because Johnston was studying the volcano from a ridge, while the resident had evacuated with her family.

Accept equivalent comparisons supported by details from both accounts. For the open response, check for three sentences, one similarity, contrasting details from each account, and an explanation connected to each person's experience.
