"They need us," she replied, handing him the twine.
- ③ By sunset, the clouds had drifted away, leaving the garden bright and wet. Maya checked the gate last, then pushed a brick against its bottom. Mr. Chen smiled. "You did not wait for someone else to fix things." Maya looked at the rows of leaves, sparkling like tiny mirrors. "Next time," she said, "we can make the garden stronger before the storm."

1	How do Maya's actions in paragraph 2 develop her character? Use two details from the paragraph.	Maya is caring and responsible. She ties the stems to stakes and lunges to catch the rolling pot so the plants will be safe.
2	What does Mr. Chen's response to Maya reveal about how he sees her? Use his words from the passage.	He sees Maya as observant and willing to take initiative. He says, "You noticed every plant" and "You did not wait for someone else to fix things."
3	What does the comparison "bent like tired dancers" help you understand about the plants and the storm?	It helps the reader picture the plants drooping or leaning in the wind. It makes the storm seem strong enough to threaten them.
4	How does Maya's final line of dialogue move the plot forward?	Her line changes the plan from saving the garden during this storm to preparing it before a future storm.
