The Bent Bridge

- ① On Saturday, Maya carried her paper bridge to the library contest. She had built it from index cards, tape, and string, hoping it would hold a stack of books. At the check-in table, a gust of wind slipped through the open door. The bridge lifted from her hands, bumped the floor, and bent sharply in the middle.
- ② Maya's throat tightened. The judges would begin testing bridges in ten minutes, and hers now sagged like a wet noodle. "I can fix it," she whispered, though she was not sure how. Her friend Eli pointed to the supply box. "Use the string as a support," he said. Maya studied the bent cards and pictured a triangle beneath them.
- ③ Her fingers shook as she taped the string from one side of the bridge to the other. The first knot slipped loose, so she tied it again, pulling hard enough to wrinkle the card. When the judge placed one book on top, Maya held her breath. The bridge stayed level. Then it held three more books, and Maya grinned at Eli. "The triangle worked," she said.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
