The Library Seed Shelf

- ① At Maple Street Library, visitors can borrow more than books. Near the front desk, a wooden cabinet holds packets of tomato, bean, and flower seeds. Each packet has a label with the plant name and planting tips. In spring, families choose a few packets, take them home, and grow the plants in gardens or pots. The seed shelf is free to use.
- ② The shelf helps people try gardening without buying a whole packet. It also gives neighbors a reason to talk about what grows well nearby. Library worker Ana Ruiz says the most popular seeds are basil and snap peas because they can grow in small spaces. In July, the library posts a chart where gardeners can record what they planted and when sprouts appeared.
- ③ The library does not expect every gardener to return seeds. Instead, it asks borrowers to share observations, such as whether a plant needed much water or attracted bees. Those notes help future gardeners make choices. Some people save seeds from plants they grew and donate them, but only after drying and labeling them carefully. By fall, the cabinet becomes a record of the community's growing season.

3	Which detail best supports the idea that the seed shelf builds community? Explain how the detail supports that idea.	The passage says the shelf gives neighbors a reason to talk about what grows well nearby. This supports the idea because the shelf can start conversations among people in the area.
4	Write two sentences describing how the cabinet changes from spring to fall. Group your details by season.	In spring, families choose seed packets and plant them at home. By fall, the cabinet becomes a record of the community's growing season.
