A Place to Read Outside

- ① Our school should create a shaded outdoor reading area beside the library. During warm months, the blacktop near the playground can become too hot for students who want to read outside. A small space with benches, a canopy, and a book box would give classes a calm place to enjoy books. It would also make outdoor learning more comfortable.
- ② First, the area could help more students use library books. The library already lends books during the school day, but many students have no quiet outdoor spot where they can open them. In addition, shade can lower the temperature under a covered space compared with direct sunlight. With a nearby book box, students could choose a book without walking across campus.
- ③ Some people may worry that the project would cost too much. However, families, local businesses, and the school could donate used benches, books, or materials for a simple canopy. Near the library, this useful space would support reading, outdoor lessons, and quiet conversation. For these reasons, our school should plan a shaded reading area for next year.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Our school should install a bike rack near the main entrance. A rack keeps bicycles upright and in one place. In addition, it can help keep nearby walkways clear when students arrive by bike. Near the entrance, students could lock their bicycles before class. For these reasons, a bike rack would make arrival safer and more organized.
