Saving Rain for the Garden

- ① Last spring, our school garden often dried out between rainy days. To save water, the garden club placed a rain barrel beneath a downspout from the tool shed. The barrel catches water that runs off the roof during storms. A screen covers its opening, keeping leaves and insects out. This stored water can later help thirsty seedlings.
- ② First, students check the weather forecast and make sure the barrel's spigot is closed before rain falls. Next, they use a small watering can to carry water to the garden beds. They pour slowly near each plant's roots instead of splashing the leaves. This careful method sends water where plants need it most and helps the garden club avoid wasting it.
- ③ Finally, the club records how many cans of barrel water it uses each week. The notes show which garden beds need the most water and when the barrel becomes empty. After a long dry spell, students may need to use a hose. Even so, the rain barrel gives the garden a useful supply of water that would otherwise flow away.
