Maya's Garden Speech

- ① On Friday, Maya will speak to the city council about turning an empty lot into a community garden. She begins, “A garden can give neighbors fresh food and a place to work together.” Before she starts, Maya plans to use a firm, respectful tone. Her opinion matters to her, but she does not want to sound angry. When she states her main claim, she will use a volume loud enough for people at the back of the room to hear.
- ② Maya explains that gardeners can collect rainwater in barrels and add compost to the soil. At this point, she will speak at a normal volume, since she is sharing details rather than making her strongest point. She will use a calm, informative tone so listeners can focus on the facts. Maya also practices enunciation. She says the words “community,” “compost,” and “volunteer” clearly, making each consonant and vowel easy to hear. Clear speech will help listeners understand unfamiliar garden words.
- ③ Near the end, Maya says, “I believe this garden would make our block healthier and more connected.” She uses a slightly stronger volume for “healthier” and “connected” to emphasize her opinion. She keeps her tone hopeful, not demanding, when she asks council members to support the plan. For her final sentence, Maya slows her speech enough to enunciate the name of the proposed garden, “Maple Street Garden,” clearly. Then she pauses, looks at the council, and says, “Thank you for listening.”

For Part 3, accept any four-sentence opinion plan with suitable volume, tone, and enunciation choices that fit the message.
