The Library Notebook

- ① On Saturday, Maya visited the Riverbend Museum to help prepare a small exhibit about the town's first library. Curator Mr. Bell placed an old notebook on a table. "This belonged to Ada Pierce, the first librarian," he explained. Maya leaned closer and asked, "May I read the page about opening day?" Mr. Bell nodded. "Use the gloves first," he said. The notebook smelled faintly of dust, but its careful handwriting made Maya picture a busy room filled with readers.
- ② One entry described the library's opening morning. Maya read aloud, "Children arrived before the doors opened, and some carried lists of books they hoped to borrow." Mr. Bell smiled and said, "That sentence shows why the library mattered." Maya copied the words into her notes and wrote that the sentence came from Ada Pierce's notebook. Then she asked, "Did the library have many books at first?" "Only three hundred," Mr. Bell answered, "but neighbors donated more every year."
- ③ Before leaving, Maya helped make a label for the exhibit. She wrote, "Ada Pierce welcomed young readers and recorded their excitement in her notebook." Mr. Bell checked the label. "Your summary is clear," he told her, "and the quotation gives visitors Ada's own voice." Maya added the notebook's date beneath the label. As she packed her bag, she said, "I want to visit the library this week and see what stories people borrow now." The old notebook had turned a local history project into a question Maya wanted to explore.
