Research Notes on City Trees

- ① When studying how city trees affect heat, a researcher begins with trustworthy sources. A 2023 report from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency explains that shade from trees can lower surface and air temperatures. In notes, record the source title, author or organization, date, and page or web link. These details let a reader find the information again. They also show where an idea came from. Copy only the exact words needed, and place quotation marks around every direct quote.
- ② Suppose a report states, “Parks can be cooler than nearby built-up areas.” A note that uses those exact words must include quotation marks and name the report. A paraphrase gives the same meaning in new language and sentence structure. For example, a student might write that green park spaces are often less hot than surrounding streets and buildings. The student must still cite the report because the idea is not original. Changing a few words, or leaving out the source, is plagiarism.
- ③ Researchers also use information ethically when gathering it. Before using a photo of a neighborhood park, check who owns it and whether its license allows reuse. A Creative Commons license may list rules, such as giving credit to the creator. Do not copy a whole article into notes when a brief summary will do. A useful summary states the main finding and leaves out smaller details. For this topic, a summary could explain that trees and parks help reduce heat in cities, based on several sources.

Use this source card: Greenview Community Garden Survey, 2025. Of 60 visitors, 42 said shade made them stay longer. The survey team wrote, "Shade is the most requested improvement." Visitors also asked for more benches and drinking water. Write three labeled notes, one direct quote, one paraphrase, and one 25 to 35 word summary, and cite the source in every note. Then write one sentence explaining how you would legally use a photo from the garden's website.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Direct quote: "Shade is the most requested improvement" (Greenview Community Garden Survey, 2025).

Paraphrase: Forty-two of the 60 surveyed visitors said shade encouraged longer visits (Greenview Community Garden Survey, 2025). Summary: The 2025 Greenview Community Garden survey found that most visitors wanted more shade, and many said it would help them stay longer. Benches and drinking water were also requested (Greenview Community Garden Survey, 2025). I would check the photo's license and give credit if its rules allow reuse.

Accept equivalent source details, explanations, and ethical-use steps stated in the passage. For the open task, check that the quote is exact and marked with quotation marks, the paraphrase uses genuinely new wording, the summary is 25 to 35 words, and each note credits the source.
