### Trees Against Heat

- ① On hot summer days, city blocks with little shade can feel much warmer than nearby parks. Urban planners are responding by planting trees along streets, near bus stops, and in schoolyards. Their goal is not simply to make neighborhoods look nicer. Tree canopies cast shade on pavement and buildings, which can lower surface and air temperatures. For this reason, many planners argue that planting and caring for trees is a practical way to help cities handle extreme heat.
- ② Scientists have found several ways that trees cool an area. Leaves block sunlight before it heats dark asphalt and building walls. Dark surfaces absorb energy and can become much hotter in direct sun than in shade. Trees also release water vapor from their leaves, a process called transpiration. As the water changes from liquid to vapor, it uses heat from the surrounding air. These details explain why one mature tree can affect more than its own trunk-sized space: its branches and leaves create a wider patch of shade and cooling.
- ③ Planting is only the first step. Young street trees need regular water, especially during dry weather, and crews may need to protect them from damage by vehicles or construction. A city that plants thousands of saplings but does not budget for care may lose many of them before they grow large enough to provide broad shade. Some people claim that any tree will cool every street equally. The earlier evidence does not support that claim, because cooling depends on the size and spread of a tree's canopy.

**PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)**

The city should plant and care for shade trees near bus stops and schoolyards first. Their canopies block sunlight from pavement and buildings, and leaves cool the air through transpiration. The city should budget for regular watering because young trees may not survive long enough to grow broad canopies without care.
