Rooftop Gardens for Pollinators

- ① **A SMALL HABITAT** In many cities, rooftops are more than empty surfaces. A rooftop garden can give bees, butterflies, and other pollinators nectar and pollen. Gardeners often choose ****native plants**** because these species grew in the region before many buildings were built. Native plants may provide food that local insects recognize. A shallow dish with stones can offer water, while the stones give insects a safe place to land. Even a few containers can make a useful stop during a busy flight.
- ② **WHY PLANT CHOICES MATTER** Some flowers have showy petals but produce little food for insects. Others bloom at different times. A garden with early, middle, and late blooming plants can supply food through much of the growing season. The word ***nectar*** means a sweet liquid that many pollinators drink. Grouping several of the same kind of flower together helps insects notice the plants. Avoiding pesticides is also important, since chemicals meant for pests can harm helpful insects and their young.
- ③ **WATCHING THE GARDEN** A rooftop garden needs regular checks. On a warm day, a gardener can watch quietly for ten minutes and write down each type of visitor. This simple record can show which flowers attract the most activity. ****Do not feed wild bees sugar water**** unless a trained expert gives a specific reason. Most bees find what they need from flowers. By sharing observations, neighbors can learn which plants help pollinators across their city in every season.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

WINDOW BIRD SAFETY Place decals on the outside of large windows so birds can see the glass. Keep feeders ****within 3 feet of a window**** or more than 30 feet away to reduce dangerous collisions. The heading tells the topic, and the bold phrase makes an important distance rule easy to find.

Accept equivalent explanations of how headings organize topics, boldface emphasizes important information, and italics call attention to a defined word. For Part 3, accept any accurate city-animal topic with a clear heading, a purposeful bolded detail, and a correct explanation of both features.
