Let Fireflies Shine

- ① On summer evenings, fireflies turn fields into blinking constellations. Yet in many neighborhoods, those signals are harder to see. Bright porch lights, parking lots, and glowing signs can cover the darkness fireflies need to find mates. Scientists call this light pollution. It does not only hide the insects from people. Artificial light can confuse fireflies and interrupt their flashing patterns. A darker night is not empty or unsafe. It is a habitat that these small animals depend on.
- ② Fireflies use flashes as messages. Each species has its own timing and pattern, so a nearby flash can mean, "I am here." When outdoor lamps shine all night, their steady glare can drown out these brief signals. In one study, researchers found that artificial light reduced the flashing activity of some firefly species. This problem reaches beyond a single yard. When fewer fireflies successfully mate, future summers may hold fewer of the familiar lights that people watch from sidewalks and campsites.
- ③ Fortunately, towns and families can make nights friendlier to fireflies without leaving paths completely dark. First, aim outdoor lights downward so they light a step, not the whole sky. Next, use shields or timers, and turn off unnecessary lights after people go inside. Choose warmer-colored bulbs when lights are needed. These changes protect firefly signals while saving energy. If a neighborhood treats darkness as a shared resource, its summer evenings can remain alive with flashes. The choice is simple: use light carefully, and let the night speak.

1	What is the author's main purpose? Use one detail from the passage to support your answer.	The author aims to persuade readers to reduce unnecessary outdoor lighting to protect fireflies. The last paragraph gives actions such as aiming lights downward and turning off unneeded lights.
2	How do the phrases "blinking constellations" and "steady glare" shape the reader's view of fireflies and artificial light?	"Blinking constellations" makes fireflies seem beautiful and special, while "steady glare" makes artificial light seem harsh and overpowering. The contrast supports the author's effort to protect fireflies.

Paragraph 1 introduces the problem of light pollution, paragraph 2 explains how it affects fireflies, and paragraph 3 offers solutions. This order shows why readers should take the suggested actions.
