### Water for the Garden

- ① On the hottest Saturday of July, Maya climbed the stairs to her apartment building's roof with a dented watering can. The rooftop garden, usually bright with basil and tomatoes, drooped beneath the city heat. Mr. Alvarez, the building manager, had locked the outdoor faucet after a pipe leaked overnight. Maya's little brother, Leo, wanted to pick the few red tomatoes for lunch. Maya looked at the dry soil and remembered the garden's rule: Everyone shared its food after helping care for it.
- ② Maya carried the can to apartment 4B, where Mrs. Chen saved rinse water from washing vegetables. Mrs. Chen offered two buckets, but Leo complained that the water looked cloudy. Maya explained that it was safe for plants, not for drinking. Hearing this, Leo set aside his lunch plan and knocked on doors with Maya. Neighbors brought leftover water from pet bowls and melted ice from coolers. On the hot roof, each small container seemed useless alone, yet together they darkened the soil around every plant.
- ③ Near sunset, Mr. Alvarez came upstairs to inspect the garden. He saw the wet soil, the empty containers, and Leo tying a sign to the gate: "Take what you need. Bring water when you can." Mr. Alvarez unlocked the faucet and promised to repair the pipe by Monday. Because the neighbors had worked together, he also changed the rule. Families could choose tomatoes that evening, as long as they left some for others. Leo handed Maya the first tomato instead of keeping it.

| 3 | How does the neighbors' water-collecting event affect Mr. Alvarez's decisions?                                 | <b>When Mr. Alvarez sees that the neighbors have watered the garden together, he unlocks the faucet, promises to repair the pipe, and changes the tomato-picking rule.</b> |
