Words Beneath the Volcano

- ① At a museum, Lena read a label about a volcano. A general dictionary listed the pronunciation as vol-KAY-no and traced the word through Italian vulcano to Vulcano, an island north of Sicily. The island was named for Vulcan, the Roman god of fire and metalworking. The dictionary also gave a related form, volcanic, meaning connected to a volcano. Lena wrote both pronunciations and origins in her notebook. She noticed that the reference used an entry, a pronunciation guide, and an origin note to give different kinds of information.
- ② In the rock gallery, a geology glossary defined magma as melted rock below Earth's surface. Its entry showed MAG-muh and noted that magma came from a Greek word meaning a thick ointment. A nearby sign used lava for melted rock after it reaches the surface. Lena used the glossary because it gave subject-specific meanings that a general dictionary might state more briefly. She compared the two entries and heard the first-syllable stress when she said magma aloud.
- ③ Before leaving, Lena studied crater, the bowl-shaped opening around a volcanic vent. A dictionary traced crater through Latin to a Greek word for a mixing bowl. She saw that the English word crater keeps the bowl idea, even though a crater may be made by an impact as well as by a volcano. For the word igneous, a geology guide gave ig-NEE-us and linked it to Latin ignis, meaning fire. Lena decided to check both a dictionary and a subject guide when studying new science words.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

I used a dictionary and a biology glossary to study photosynthesis. The dictionary gives the pronunciation foe-toh-SIN-thuh-sis and traces photo to a Greek word meaning “light” and synthesis to Greek roots meaning “putting together.” The biology glossary defines photosynthesis as the process in which plants, algae, and some bacteria use light energy to make sugars from carbon dioxide and water, and photosynthetic is a related word.

Accept equivalent pronunciation spellings and accurate descriptions of stressed syllables. For Part 3, accept any science word not used in the passage if the student identifies two appropriate reference materials and gives accurate pronunciation, origin, specialized meaning, and derivation information.
