Cooler City Blocks

- ① On a hot afternoon, a city block can feel like an oven. Dark pavement absorbs sunlight and releases heat slowly, while buildings can block cooling breezes. Street trees change that experience. Their leaves create shade over sidewalks, benches, and bus stops. A shaded surface stays cooler than one in direct sun. Trees also make a block more inviting, giving people a place to walk, wait, and talk outside. During summer, this difference can matter most to people who spend time outdoors.
- ② Trees cool the air in more than one way. First, shade keeps sunlight from heating pavement as much. In addition, trees release water vapor through tiny openings in their leaves. As the water changes to vapor, it uses heat energy from the surrounding air. This process, called transpiration, can help cool the area near the tree. Because several trees work together, a tree-lined street may feel cooler than a nearby street with little shade at noon.
- ③ However, planting a tree is not an instant solution. Young trees have small canopies, so they provide less shade than mature trees. They also need water and care, especially during dry weather. Still, planning can increase their benefits. For example, planting trees near sunny sidewalks and bus stops places shade where people need it. Choosing species that fit the local climate and available space can help trees live longer. In this way, careful planting connects a city's design to cooler outdoor spaces.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Preparing a backpack the night before can make a school morning calmer. First, a student can check the schedule and place each needed book, paper, and device in the bag. This step prevents a rushed search when it is time to leave. In addition, packing a lunch or filling a water bottle ahead of time reduces the number of morning jobs. The results continue at school. Because the student has the correct materials, class can begin with fewer delays. A completed homework assignment is less likely to be forgotten at home. As a result, the student can focus on learning instead of worrying about missing supplies. This small routine turns preparation into a smoother start.
