Monarchs on the Move

- ① Each fall, monarch butterflies begin a remarkable journey. Some monarchs travel from the United States and Canada to mountain forests in central Mexico. The butterflies cannot make the return trip in spring; later generations continue north. In our science club, we read about this migration and built a map for the hallway. our map showed arrows, resting areas, and dates. It also included a question for visitors: "How can people help monarchs in nearby gardens?"
- ② First, club members checked several sources before making the display. they learned that monarch caterpillars eat milkweed leaves, while adult monarchs drink nectar from many flowers. One card tells visitors, "Plant native milkweed and avoid pesticides". Another card explains that the map are easy to read from the hall. The heading above it says "A Buterflys Journey South." Students added small drawings of flowers and a key for the colored arrows. These details helped readers understand the long trip.
- ③ During lunch, the club invited classmates to add ideas to the display. Many students suggested a garden with native flowers. Because monarchs need places to rest and feed during migration. one student said "We could ask the principal for a sunny garden bed." The group made a list of jobs: measure the space, choose plants, and water seedlings. They planned to share the list at the next meeting, but nobody were sure who would speak. The final poster was almost finnished.
