Trees at Transit Stops

- ① Good morning. My topic is how city trees can make neighborhoods safer during hot weather. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency explains that pavement and buildings absorb heat, making cities warmer than nearby rural areas. Trees help because their leaves provide shade, and water released from leaves can cool the air. In this presentation, I will compare tree cover near bus stops with tree cover in parks. I will also explain why shade matters most to people who wait outside for buses.
- ② First, I used the National Weather Service Heat Index page. It says heat can feel more dangerous when humidity is high because sweat evaporates more slowly. That source helps explain why a shaded bus stop is not always cool enough. I also checked New York City's Street Tree Map, which shows locations of public street trees. On the map, several busy bus stops have few nearby trees. I would show this map on a slide and say that it shows a need for more shade, not proof that any one stop is unsafe.
- ③ To conclude, planting and caring for trees near transit stops could make waiting areas more comfortable. According to the EPA, trees can lower temperatures through shade and evaporation. The tree inventory map suggests where the city could begin looking, especially near stops with little tree cover. However, the map does not tell us whether a tree is healthy, whether it shades the sidewalk at bus time, or who owns nearby land. For that reason, I would recommend that city staff visit selected stops before choosing planting sites.
