COMPLETE AND CORRECT

A correct sentence has a complete thought. If it has two complete thoughts, it uses a period, semicolon, or comma plus a coordinating conjunction to join them.

The parrot copied a whistle after lunch.

RUN-ON SENTENCE

A run-on joins two complete thoughts without the right punctuation. A comma by itself cannot join two complete thoughts.

Snow covered the meadow, the sledders stayed home.
