Moon Mission Notes

- ① To learn about Apollo 11, Maya opened a NASA transcript of radio messages from July 20, 1969. A transcript made from the mission’s original communications is a primary source. As the lunar module reached the Moon, commander Neil Armstrong reported, “The Eagle has landed.” Maya copied the words exactly, placed quotation marks around them, and named the NASA transcript in her notes. A direct quote preserves a speaker’s exact language, so it must be short, accurate, and credited.
- ② Then Maya read a Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum article that explained the mission. This secondary source drew on records and later research. Instead of copying its sentences, Maya wrote that Apollo 11 put the first people on the Moon and brought lunar rocks back to Earth for study. Her sentence kept the main finding but used her own wording. She still listed the museum article, because paraphrased ideas need credit too. A summary would give only the article’s most important points.
- ③ Before publishing her report, Maya checked each note against its source. She used one brief quotation from the transcript and paraphrased the museum’s finding. In a source list, she included the title, organization, date, and web address for each source. She did not copy a photograph, chart, or long passage without permission. Giving credit helps readers locate evidence and respects creators’ work. It also prevents plagiarism, which is presenting someone else’s words or ideas as your own.

NASA's July 20, 1969 transcript records Armstrong saying, "The Eagle has landed." According to the Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum, the mission carried the first humans to the lunar surface and returned specimens that researchers could examine.
