Labels That Tell More

- ① At the city museum, Maya paused beside a case of tiny clay tablets. A label called them cuneiform, a noun meaning a system of wedge-shaped writing used in ancient Mesopotamia. Maya checked a learner's dictionary and heard its pronunciation, kyoo-NEE-uh-form. The entry traced the word to Latin cuneus, meaning wedge, plus forma, meaning shape. Knowing those roots helped her picture pointed marks that scribes carefully pressed into wet clay in Mesopotamia long ago by hand.
- ② Another card used the adjective archaeological to describe the dig where the tablets were found. A specialized archaeology glossary defined archaeological as related to the scientific study of human history through material remains. Its base word, archaeology, comes from Greek archaios, ancient, and logia, study. The glossary also showed the related noun archaeologist, a person who studies evidence from past human life. Maya noticed that the suffix -ist changes the idea from a field of study to a person.
- ③ Before leaving, Maya searched a digital etymology dictionary for transcribe, a verb meaning to make a written copy. It listed the Latin prefix trans-, meaning across, and scribere, meaning to write. The entry gave the pronunciation tran-SKRIBE and named transcript as a related noun, a written copy or record. Maya then compared the two tools. The general dictionary helped with pronunciation and everyday meaning, while the specialized glossary gave a precise meaning for a field-specific adjective.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

My word is photosynthesis, a noun pronounced foe-toh-SIN-thuh-sis. A general dictionary says it is the process by which plants make food using light. A science glossary gives the precise meaning: plants, algae, and some bacteria use light energy to make glucose from carbon dioxide and water, releasing oxygen. An etymology dictionary traces photo- to Greek phōs, meaning light, and synthesis to Greek synthesis, meaning putting together.

Accept equivalent pronunciation spellings that clearly show the correct stressed syllable. For Part 3, accept varied academic words if all required details are accurate and the student uses both a general and a specialized reference source.
