Lena's Repair

- ① On Saturday morning, Lena unlocked the gate to her grandfather's small greenhouse. Cool air smelled of damp soil and mint. She carried a chipped blue watering can between crowded shelves, aiming its thin silver stream at the drooping basil. Outside, rain tapped the glass roof. Then Lena noticed the tomato vines sagging under a snapped cord. Her grandfather would return from the market at noon, and she wanted the plants standing tall before he arrived.
- ② An hour earlier, Grandpa had shown Lena how to tie a soft cloth strip around a weak stem. Now, she searched the potting bench, but only brittle twine lay in the drawer. In the kitchen, she found an old cotton apron with a torn pocket. She cut three narrow strips, climbed onto a wooden stool, and gently lifted each vine. Soon, the stems rested against their bamboo stakes instead of dragging across the wet floor.
- ③ By noon, the rain had thinned to a mist, and the greenhouse glowed pale green. Grandpa stepped through the gate, carrying a crate of peaches. At first, Lena waited beside the shelves, certain he would spot the apron strips. He did. He touched one knot, then looked at her with a surprised grin. Later, while they washed dirt from their hands at the sink, Lena explained her repair. The steady drip of water sounded different now, like a quiet applause.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What words signal the move backward in time in paragraph 2? What happened at that earlier time?	"An hour earlier" signals the shift backward. Grandpa had shown Lena how to tie a soft cloth strip around a weak stem.
2	Where does Lena go after looking in the potting bench drawer, and which words show the setting shift?	She goes to the kitchen. The phrase "In the kitchen" shows the setting shift.
3	Put these actions in order: Lena cuts apron strips, Lena notices the snapped cord, Lena lifts the vines, Grandpa sees the repair.	1. Lena notices the snapped cord. 2. Lena cuts apron strips. 3. Lena lifts the vines. 4. Grandpa sees the repair.
4	Which two details in paragraph 3 show Grandpa's response to Lena's repair? What do they suggest about his reaction?	He "touched one knot" and looked at Lena with "a surprised grin." These details suggest that he notices her careful work and is pleased.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)
