A Better Start Time

- ① Riverton Middle School should begin classes at 8:30 instead of 7:45. This change would give students more time to sleep, which can improve alertness during first-period learning. The American Academy of Pediatrics has said that middle and high schools should aim for start times of 8:30 a.m. or later to help adolescents get enough sleep. A later bell would not solve every learning problem, but it would remove one daily barrier that many students face before they open a book.
- ② Research gives a practical reason for the proposal. Teenagers' body clocks naturally shift later during puberty, so many do not feel sleepy early enough to fall asleep soon after dinner. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reports that most middle and high school students do not get the sleep they need on school nights. When a student arrives exhausted, paying attention, remembering directions, and participating in discussion become harder. Therefore, moving the schedule later connects a health need to a classroom benefit.
- ③ Some families may worry that a later start would push sports, jobs, or bus schedules later in the day. School leaders should study those effects and adjust routes or activity times where possible. Still, scheduling difficulties are reasons to plan carefully, not reasons to ignore student sleep. Districts that consider a later bell can ask transportation staff, coaches, families, and students for solutions before changing the timetable. Because the proposal addresses both learning and health while allowing room for planning, Riverton should test an 8:30 start for one semester.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Riverton Middle School should install covered bike racks near the main entrance. On rainy mornings, bicycles left in the open have wet seats and slippery handlebars. The current rack is also far from the door, so students must cross the busy drop-off lane twice. A covered rack beside the entrance would protect bikes and make arriving safer. Although building it would cost money, the school could begin with a small shelter that holds twenty bicycles. This practical change would make biking to school a more useful choice for students.

Accept equivalent wording for the claim, evidence, and reasoning questions when students accurately use details from the passage. For the paragraph, look for a focused school-related claim, two concrete supporting details, clear reasoning, and a response to a reasonable concern.
