A Quiet Corner Proposal

- ① Our school library should add a small quiet corner for students who need a calm place to read or begin homework. During planning, the library team listed busy times, mapped an unused space near the windows, and surveyed classmates. Forty-two students responded, and thirty-five said noise made it hard to concentrate. Those notes helped the team choose a clear goal: create a space that supports focused work without closing the library to other nearby students.
- ② In drafting, the team wrote a proposal with two tables, six chairs, and a low bookshelf. They explained that students could use the corner during study hall and before school. During revising, they replaced the phrase "silent zone" with "quiet corner," because a library can still include soft page turns and brief questions. They also added a rule that phones stay in backpacks. Finally, while editing, they corrected spelling, checked capital letters, and made sure each sentence clearly connected to the proposal.
- ③ The proposal ends by bringing its reasons together. A quiet corner would give students a practical place to focus, use library space wisely, and follow simple shared rules. The team asks the principal to approve a one-month trial with the existing furniture. At the end of the trial, the librarian could count daily users and collect student comments. This plan is affordable, testable, and based on what students said they need. For these reasons, the school should create the quiet corner this semester.

Plan: Goal, add a covered bike rack near the front entrance. Reasons, it would keep bicycle seats dry and make biking to school easier. Our school should add a covered bike rack near the front entrance. Students who ride bicycles now leave them in an open rack beside the sidewalk. Rain can soak the seats and make the ride home uncomfortable. A covered rack would protect bicycles during rain and snow. ~~It would be good.~~ It would also give students a dry place to lock their bikes before class. The rack could hold twelve bicycles and use space already near the entrance. The school should add the covered bike rack this year. It would make bicycle parking more useful in wet weather, and it would support students who choose to ride to school.
