A Prairie Visit

- ① On saturday, students at Riverbend Middle School visited a nearby prairie preserve. Their guide explained that prairies once covered large parts of North America, today, only small areas remain. The group watched monarch butterflies land on blazing star flowers. "These plants provide nectar," said Ms. Ortiz. she also pointed out grasses with deep roots, which help hold soil in place during heavy rain. Before leaving, each student sketched one plant and wrote a question in a field notebook.
- ② At the preserve, volunteers remove invasive plants, such as garlic mustard, because these species can crowd out native flowers. One volunteer said, "We was surprised by how quickly the mustard spreads." She explained that workers pull the plants before they form seeds. The volunteers do not throw the plants into compost piles, the seeds could survive and spread again. Instead, they bag the plants for disposal. This careful work helps native insects find food and shelter.
- ③ After the visit, the science club planned a native-plant garden beside the school entrance. Everyone bring a reusable water bottle, gloves, and a small trowel for planting day. The club will ask the principal for permission and will measure the sunny space. Then students will choose plants that grow well in the local climate. By caring for the garden each week the students hope it will become a safe stop for pollinators, including bees, butterflies, and other animals that carry pollen between flowers.
