A Place for Bikes

- ① Our school should install covered bike racks near the main entrance. At present, students who ride bicycles leave them along fences or carry locks through the day. This crowded setup can block walkways and expose bikes to rain. A covered rack would give riders one clear place to park. It would also show that the school values safe, active travel. For these reasons, the principal should include bike racks in the next campus improvement plan.
- ② First, bicycle racks can make arrival safer and more orderly. During a five-day count, the student council found 18 bicycles parked at fences or signposts near the entrance. Those places were not designed for parking and left handlebars sticking into the walking path. In contrast, a rack keeps bicycles upright and together. Because students and visitors use the entrance each morning, clear walkways matter. Therefore, covered racks would solve a real safety problem for everyone at school.
- ③ Additionally, covered racks may help more students choose to ride. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states that young people ages 6 through 17 need 60 minutes or more of physical activity daily. Riding to school can add movement to a student's day. A protected place to park removes one worry about riding, especially when rain is expected. Although racks will not make every student bike, they give interested riders a practical option. The principal should approve the project this year.
