Maya's Rain Garden Proposal

- ① For a student council presentation, Maya proposed installing a rain garden beside the school parking lot. Her first slide showed a photo of the low, puddled area after a storm, with arrows pointing to the drains. She explained that rain gardens are shallow planted areas that collect stormwater and let some of it soak into the ground. Instead of opening with a general claim, Maya described the problem students could see from the bus line: water spreading across cracked pavement.
- ② Next, Maya used a simple map to show where runoff from the roof and parking lot moves during heavy rain. A caption named the proposed garden site and listed its planned size: 600 square feet. Maya also included a bar graph based on the school's facilities records. It showed that staff reported standing water near the entrance on 18 school days last year. These details helped her audience understand both the location and the repeated effect of the drainage problem.
- ③ To close, Maya gave details about the garden's appearance and care. She said native plants with deep roots would hold soil in place, and a labeled drawing showed stones at the inlet where water would enter. Her final slide listed a cost estimate of \$2,400 and cited the district grounds manager as its source. Maya did not add facts about unrelated benefits, such as playground equipment. Each description, visual, and number answered a question her audience might have about the proposal.

4	Why did Maya leave out facts about playground equipment?	Playground equipment is unrelated to the rain garden proposal and would not answer the audience's questions about it.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

Slide 1, visual: a photo of the west-side blacktop at lunch. The photo shows benches in direct sun and students squeezed into a thin strip of wall shade. It identifies the exact place the proposal would improve. Slide 2, visual: a labeled map of benches, the fire lane, and proposed trees. The map places three trees beside the benches, not in the fire lane, so the audience can judge the plan's location. Slide 3, visual: a simple diagram of shade from mature tree canopies. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention advises people to seek shade during hot weather, so shade near lunch seating is pertinent to student comfort. Accept equivalent descriptions of how each fact, detail, or visual supports Maya's specific proposal. For the open task, accept varied school improvements when the visuals and details clearly relate to the proposal and any factual claims are sourced.
