Peregrines in the City

- ① On a spring morning, a peregrine falcon may appear as a small dark mark above a city street. Then it folds its wings and drops in a hunting dive called a stoop. Peregrines once declined in much of North America because the pesticide DDT thinned their eggshells. After restrictions on DDT and careful recovery work, many populations returned. Some falcons now nest on bridges and tall buildings, whose narrow ledges resemble the cliff faces they used before cities rose around them.
- ② City life offers both shelter and danger. A building may provide an elevated nesting site, but glass and traffic can harm birds. To follow a falcon's movements, researchers attach a lightweight transmitter, a device that sends signals to a satellite or receiver. The data can show where the bird travels, how long it remains in one place, and whether it survives a migration. Because a transmitter must not interfere with flight, scientists choose one that weighs only a small fraction of the falcon's body mass.
- ③ Each spring, volunteers and biologists watch known nest sites from a respectful distance. They record the number of eggs, chicks, and fledglings, young birds that have left the nest. Their observations help wildlife agencies notice problems early, such as repeated nest failures or a shortage of prey. Still, a successful nest does not prove that every threat has vanished. A single pair can raise young in one season while facing different conditions the next year. Long-term records, rather than one dramatic sighting, reveal whether a population is truly stable.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

At dusk, the _nocturnal_ owl / left its daytime shelter and glided silently above the field, hunting while most other birds rested.
