The Seed Exchange Podcast

- ① On Saturday, Maya visited the city library to record a short podcast about its seed exchange. Librarian Mr. Chen opened a drawer filled with tiny paper packets. “Each packet holds a chance to grow food,” he said. Maya held up a packet of basil and asked, “May I take one home?” “Yes,” Mr. Chen replied, “but bring seeds back after your plants grow.” Maya wrote his words in her notebook before turning on the recorder.
- ② During the recording, Maya explained that the library gives gardeners a way to share local seeds. Mr. Chen pointed to a sign near the door. “Please label each packet with the plant’s name and year,” it read. Maya asked why the year mattered. “Old seeds may not sprout as well,” he explained. Then she quoted his earlier advice for listeners: “Bring back seeds from your healthiest plants.” The quote helped her report his exact words, rather than merely summarize them.
- ③ Before leaving, Maya checked the audio with her partner, Luis. “Did we include Mr. Chen’s advice about labels?” Luis asked. Maya listened again and answered, “We did, and we also explained the seed exchange.” Luis smiled. “Our ending needs one clear message,” he said. Maya suggested, “Tell listeners to borrow a packet, plant it, and save seeds to share.” They chose that ending because it connected the interview to a simple action. Their finished podcast credited Mr. Chen and invited neighbors to visit the library.
