A Careful Museum Label

- ① At Harborview Museum, Maya drafted a label for a nineteenth-century ship’s compass. Her first version said, “This instrument helped captains keep a steady direction during a journey.” Before printing the label, Maya circled instrument and journey. She knew a guessed spelling could confuse visitors and make the exhibit seem careless. Instead of relying on memory, she opened a desk dictionary and searched for each word near the guide words at the tops of the pages.
- ② The dictionary listed instrument, not intrument, and journey, not journey. Maya copied the correct spellings into her revised label. Next, she wanted to add a sentence about the compass needle. Her draft used the word “magnetized,” but she was unsure whether it needed one or two n’s. A digital dictionary showed magnetized with one n. Maya also read the definition to make sure the word fit: a magnetized needle responds to Earth’s magnetic field.
- ③ For names and specialized terms, Maya used more than a general dictionary. The museum’s collection database gave the maker’s name as “Edward Nairne,” and a local-history book confirmed the spelling. She compared both sources before adding the name to the label. Maya saved a note naming the references she had consulted. Her final label was easier to trust because every uncertain word, name, and term had been checked in a source designed to provide reliable spelling.
