Studying an Earthquake

- ① Historians studying the 1906 San Francisco earthquake can use a primary source, created by people who investigated the event soon after it happened. In 1908, the California State Earthquake Investigation Commission published a report based on field observations. One researcher quoted its finding: “The earthquake was felt over an area of approximately 372,000 square miles” (Lawson, 1908, p. 7). The quotation uses the report’s exact words, quotation marks, and a source note. A writer should quote only wording that matters to the point being made.
- ② A secondary source interprets, compares, or explains information from earlier sources. A recent United States Geological Survey web page describes the 1906 earthquake as having an estimated magnitude of 7.9. Instead of repeating the page’s sentence, a student wrote that scientists now estimate the quake’s magnitude at about 7.9 (USGS, 2024). This paraphrase keeps the finding but changes the wording and sentence structure. It also credits the USGS, because an idea needs a citation even when no words are copied.
- ③ A summary combines important findings into a brief overview. In a study of rain gardens, a writer might state that planted areas reduced storm-water runoff, without listing every measurement. Ethical research also means checking whether a newer source is protected by copyright. Use a short quotation only when needed, and cite every source so readers can locate it. These choices respect both the creator’s work and the reader’s need to verify information.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

The report states, "Counters recorded 1,240 bicycle trips on May 6" (Riverside Transportation Department, 2025). The article reports that bicycle trips rose 18 percent from May 2024 to May 2025 (River City Times, 2025). Together, the sources show that May bicycle travel increased compared with the previous year. I used only the needed quotation and cited both sources so readers can trace the information.

Accept accurate paraphrases and summaries that use original wording and retain the source findings. For the open task, check for exactly four sentences, a direct quotation with citation, a changed-wording paraphrase with citation, a 12- to 18-word combined summary, and a valid ethical or legal choice.
