PRIMARY SOURCE

A primary source comes directly from a person who experienced an event or collected information firsthand. It gives original evidence.

A scientist's lab notebook recording plant-growth measurements.

SECONDARY SOURCE

A secondary source explains, analyzes, or combines information from other sources. It helps readers understand a topic.

A magazine article explaining findings from several archaeology studies.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **PRIMARY:** A letter written by a soldier during World War I.
- **SECONDARY:** A scholarly article that interprets World War I letters.

Challenge: Research question: How did families respond to rationing during World War II? Primary source: A 1943 letter from a parent describing ration coupons would be useful because it gives a firsthand account from the time. Secondary source: A historian's book about wartime rationing would be useful because it explains patterns using evidence from many sources.

Accept explanations that identify firsthand or original evidence for primary sources and explanation, analysis, or summary for secondary sources. A source's category can depend on the research question, but each item is classified by its most direct use here.
