The Safety First Banner

- ① At dawn, I found the town hall lights glowing over the empty square. My mother, the mayor, had planned a festival to celebrate the repaired river wall. In the records room, I discovered that the engineer’s newest report warned that a weak section still needed work. If I showed Mother the report, she might cancel the festival and lose the election. If I hid it, families could gather beside a wall that might fail during spring rain.
- ② My cousin Niko had been assigned to hang festival banners, but he kept tangling them in the clock tower’s old pulley. Each time he pulled a rope, a new banner fell across his face, and he shouted directions to pigeons that ignored him. I climbed the stairs to help, forgetting the report for a moment. Niko finally asked why I looked “like a wet textbook.” His jokes made me laugh, but his question made me admit what I had found.
- ③ When dark clouds rolled above the river, I carried the report to the square. Mother read it while Niko accidentally dropped a banner that said SAFETY FIRST across the stage. People laughed, then noticed Mother’s face. She stopped the music, closed the riverside booths, and ordered workers to inspect the wall. From where I stood, her choice seemed braver than winning. Niko’s nonsense eased the tense scene, yet it also made the warning impossible to ignore.

#	QUESTION	ANSWER
1	What plot pattern shapes the main conflict? Explain how the conflict creates meaning in the passage.	The main plot is a drama. The narrator must choose between protecting the mayor's election chances and warning people about danger, which develops the idea that safety and honesty matter more than public success.
2	How does Niko's comic subplot influence the narrator as a character? Use one detail from the passage.	Niko's jokes make the narrator laugh and help the narrator admit finding the report. His comic behavior gives the worried narrator a brief release and pushes the narrator toward honesty.
3	How does the comic subplot affect the pacing of the story? Compare the clock tower scene with the final scene.	The banner trouble in the clock tower slows the serious conflict and gives the reader a pause. The dark clouds and the report in the final scene increase the pace as the danger becomes urgent.
4	How does the first-person point of view shape the reader's understanding of Mother's final choice?	The reader sees Mother through the narrator's thoughts and observations. The narrator calls her choice brave, but the reader does not directly know Mother's private thoughts or feelings.

PART 3 • YOUR TURN (SAMPLE ANSWER)

On the day of the robotics final, I learned that our team's code had erased the emergency stop command. While I searched for the backup file, my little brother used the practice robot to chase a sandwich across the gym. His ridiculous chase made the waiting crowd laugh, but it also gave me a moment to think clearly and tell the judges the truth. The comic subplot briefly slows the tense drama and supports the theme that honesty matters more than a prize.

Accept answers that identify the serious plot as drama and the banner events as a comic subplot. Students may describe the theme as honesty, responsibility, courage, or public safety, as long as they support the idea with passage details.
