Why Cities Stay Hot

- ① On a summer afternoon, city blocks can feel hotter than nearby parks. This difference is called the urban heat island effect. Dark roofs and asphalt have low albedo, meaning they reflect little sunlight and absorb much of its energy. The stored energy is later released as heat. Trees change this pattern. Their leaves provide shade, and water evaporating from leaves cools the surrounding air. A tree canopy, the layer of branches and leaves overhead, can make a sidewalk more comfortable for people walking home.
- ② Heat islands are not only uncomfortable. Higher temperatures can increase demand for air conditioning, which strains an electrical grid, the network that delivers electricity. They can also worsen health risks during heat waves, especially for people without cool indoor spaces. City planners use data to identify the hottest neighborhoods and choose strategies to mitigate, or lessen, the problem. For example, cool roofs use light-colored materials with higher albedo. Some cities also replace unused pavement with planted areas, where shade and evaporation cool the site and rainwater can soak into the ground.
- ③ Vocabulary helps residents discuss choices clearly. Saying that a roof is "better" is general language, but saying that its high albedo reflects more sunlight is precise academic language. Similarly, infrastructure refers to built systems that serve a community, such as roads, pipes, and power lines. When planners add trees, shade structures, and cooler surfaces, they improve infrastructure while reducing heat exposure. Residents can use this vocabulary in public meetings to ask how a proposal will affect their block. Precise words help speakers explain evidence, compare options, and take part in decisions.
