Peregrines in the City

- ① On a spring morning, a peregrine falcon may circle above a city bridge. The bird searches for pigeons, which are one of its common prey. Peregrines can dive at remarkable speeds, their streamlined bodies and pointed wings help them move through the air. A watcher near the bridge might whisper, "did you see that?" the falcon has already disappeared behind the buildings. Scientists have helped some peregrine populations recover after pesticide limits and nest-protection efforts.
- ② City nesting gives peregrines tall ledges that resemble cliff faces. Falcon watchers sometimes place a small camera near a nest, but they keep their distance so adults can care for chicks. Years ago, DDT caused peregrine eggshells to become thin and break more easily. The pesticide moved through food chains. Because DDT was restricted in the United States in 1972, many peregrine populations began to increase. Careful monitoring is still important, researchers count nests and protect nesting areas.
- ③ People can help by giving nesting birds space. If you notice a falcon on a ledge, do not approach the nest or try to feed it. instead report an injured bird to a licensed wildlife rehabilitator or a local animal-control agency. You shouldnt remove a young bird from the ground unless an expert tells you to act, fledglings often spend time on the ground while learning to fly. Watching from far away lets people enjoy these powerful hunters safely.
